

Instructions to Authors

Submission of an article implies that the article is original and is not being considered for publication elsewhere. Submission also implies that all the authors have approved the paper for release in *Cybium* and are in agreement with its content.

Types of contribution

1. Review articles
2. Original research papers (Regular papers)
3. Ichthyological notes

1. *Review articles*: They should be concise (up to 15 printed pages, i.e., 67,500 characters). The abstract should outline the review interest for ichthyologists, its main points and objectives. Colour plates and pdf will be offered free of charge.

2. *Regular papers* : Should report only original results. They are limited to 6-8 printed pages (27,000 37,000 characters). One colour plate and pdf will be offered free of charge.

3. *Ichthyological notes*: Short communications, which do not occupy more than four printed pages (16,000 characters). One colour plate and pdf will be offered free of charge.

Manuscript submission

The manuscripts are to be submitted **in English** with abstract in French.

The Editorial team reserves the right to ask the authors whose mother language is not English, the certificate of professional English editor or the certificate of an English speaking person.

Manuscript preparation

Manuscripts should be prepared with numbered pages, with double spacing throughout and 2.5 cm right and left margins.

They should be organised in the following order:

- a. Title: Brief, clear and referring to the content of the article ; common name of species should be avoided.
- b. Name(s) of author(s) followed by (1) (2)... for the address.
- c. Complete postal address(es) of affiliations preceded by (1) (2)... and E-mail addresses for every authors; Indicate name and E-mail address of the corresponding author.

- d. Number of characters (spaces included) of the article (including title, abstracts, references and legends).
- e. Short title limited to 6 words.
- f. Abstract in English; should be clear, descriptive and no longer than 400 words.
- g. Title in French
- h. Abstract in French.
- i. Key words (6 items max.).
- j. Introduction: Should indicate the precise purposes of the study.
- k. Material studied, area descriptions, methods and techniques.
- l. Results.
- m. Discussion: Should be separated from the results.
- n. Acknowledgements.
- o. References.
- p. Figure and table legends.

When first cited in the article, all species should be identified by their Latin name in italic, followed by their authors and date.

The Editorial team could return to the authors their manuscript, if it is not prepared according to this guide, in particular regarding the size of illustrations and the reference presentation.

References

All references quoted in the text must be found in the reference list at the end of the article. The manuscript should be carefully checked to ensure that spelling of author's names and dates are exactly the same in the text as in the reference list.

In the text, do conform to the following examples: Lévêque (1983), (Lévêque, 1983a, 1983b, 1986), (Hopson and Hopson, 1965), (Daget, 1957; Blache *et al.*, 1978). The references must follow a chronological order. When there is more than two authors, the name of the first author should be used followed by '*et al.*' in italic.

The references should be listed as follows:

For periodicals:

DAYTON P.K., MORDIDA B.J. & BACON F., 1994. - Polar marine communities. *Am. Zool.*, 34: 90-99.

For book chapters and proceedings:

DAYTON P.K., 1990. - Polar benthos. *In: Polar Oceanography, Part B: Chemistry, Biology, and Geology* (Smith W.O., ed.), pp. 631-685. San Diego: Academic Press.

For books:

NELSON J.S., 1994. - Fishes of the World (3rd edit.). 600 p. New York: John Wiley & Sons.

The titles of the periodicals must be abbreviated according to the international rules of abbreviations.

The publications 'in press' are accepted in the reference list but not the articles 'submitted for publication' or 'in preparation'; they should not be cited in the reference list but mentioned in the text as 'unpublished data'.

In the case of publications in non-Latin alphabets, the titles must be translated in English and a notation such as '(in Russian)' should be added.

Illustrations

In the text:

All tables and figures must be quoted in the text, and numbered according to their sequence: table I; (Tab. I); (Tabs I, II); figure 1; (Fig. 1) (Figs 1, 2).

Figures and tables should never be included in the text.

Tables:

Tables should be prepared with Excel (xls) or Word (doc) software. Authors should take notice of the limitations, set by the size and lay-out of the journal. Large tables should be avoided.

Figures:

For drawings and photographs, a scale bar must be indicated on each figure. Indications of magnification (x 1000) are not accepted.

The original figures should be provided printed at high quality and at the size wished for the printed version.

Three widths are allowed: 8.5, 12 and 17.5 cm; maximal height is 22.0 cm. Beware of possible reduction during final preparation of the figures. Label the figures using Times font for a final size of Times 9.

For the photographs in colour and in B&W, and for drawings (1 figure per file), supply files to the following format: JPEG, PSD (Photoshop), EPS (Photoshop, Illustrator), with a definition at least of 300 dpi (final format).

Caution! Do not send figures in GIF, BMP, PICT, WPG format; do not send files that are too low in resolution; do not send graphs that are disproportionately large for the content.

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The Editorial team entrusts manuscripts to two experts of the speciality attending the conference. After definitive acceptance of the manuscript, minor modifications concerning exclusively the style (and the illustrations) can be directly introduced by the Editorial team without consulting the authors, to accelerate the publication.

Proofs

One set of proofs will be sent to the corresponding author indicated on the title page of the manuscript.

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
